STUDENT SUCCESS

Faculty and students work together to help you be successful in your coursework and the program. The ASCEND Center, located in room 4144 of the Health Science Center, demonstrates the Mission of Saint Anthony College of Nursing through academic coaching and tutoring. Students are encouraged and invited to seek academic help as soon as there is a pattern of low grades for assignments or testing and/or for professor/advisor recommendation. The best success is achieved when asking for help before midterm. An experienced nursing professor is available on Thursday afternoon, 12-5pm or Friday morning, 9-12pm. These hours may vary from semester to semester. More ASCEND Center information is available on CANVAS. You can make an appointment via CANVAS email or drop-in at the ASCEND Center.

Academic support focuses on your learning style and your experiences with assignments or testing. Some of the improvement activities include adapted study skills, taking notes, writing papers, testing practice, accessing ATI and Evolve, time management, and clarifying course assignments. Success comes as you practice and gain confidence in your nursing studies

FACULTY OFFICE HOURS

Faculty have a minimum of three scheduled office hours per week. These office hours may be physically on either campus or held virtually.

COLLEGE POLICIES

Although not all college policies are included in this syllabus, students and faculty are required to follow policies as outlined in the *College Catalog*.

COURSE SYLLABI

A specific syllabi is developed by the faculty for each course. These course syllabi are subject to change by faculty. Faculty are obligated to notify students of these changes.

REPEATING STUDENTS

If you are repeating a course, you must submit new original work during the semester. Build upon

your experiences from the previous effort in the course.

ATTENDANCE

Promptness and attendance are hallmarks of professionalism. Students who are tardy or absent from class are responsible for content presented during the missed class. Class discussions and participation points cannot be accrued when class is missed. Patterns of absenteeism and tardiness are monitored and disciplinary action may be instituted at the discretion of the faculty. Extenuating circumstances are reviewed on an individual basis. Regardless of absenteeism, the course requirements and/or clinical competencies must still be met by each student.

READINGS/ASSIGNMENTS/CANVAS ACTIVITIES/DUE DATES

The course calendar is designed to help you organize your time and responsibilities. Make sure to be aware of what is due on what day. In order to facilitate learning, please read the required assignments prior to class time to enable you to fully participate in classroom discussion. Assignments are due according to the specific course syllabus. Deductions may be taken for tardy submission of assignments if prior arrangements are not made with the instructor. Instructors also have the right to refuse to accept late assignments.

CLASS PARTICIPATION

Class participation is an integral part of the learning process and an expectation for your courses. It is expected that students arrive to class prepared to fully participate in class discussion and activities.

WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS

A hallmark of a professional nurse is the ability to write. Before submission, it is in your best interest to proofread and check your work for proper grammar and spelling. Context, vocabulary, and content must represent college level competency aligned with your student status. Junior and senior level rubrics have been developed by the faculty and are utilized to grade many written assignments.

EXAMINATIONS/QUIZZES

The College has established guidelines for testing.

- Unless otherwise stated, examinations/quizzes are to be completed independently without the assistance of others or other resources such as textbooks, notes/Power points, websites, or other study materials.
- Students are expected to take examinations, tests and/or quizzes as scheduled; failure to complete these as scheduled will result in achieving a grade of zero. In the event of a serious emergency, illness or extenuating circumstance students may request to take the exam which will be/was missed. Permission must be requested in writing/email before the exam begins. The request must be submitted to and acknowledged by the course coordinator prior to the missed examination unless the critical nature of the emergency prohibits it. Students may be asked to provide documentation supporting the request for alternative testing times.
- Missed examinations are to be taken on the first day of the student's return to class or clinical at a time designated by the instructor and outside of class or clinical experiences. If a make-up examination is allowed, an alternate form of the test may be administered.
- In-class examinations may not be repeated in an attempt to achieve an improved grade.

- You must bring your own computer to class for all examinations. You will use the calculator imbedded in the exam.
- Students are responsible for their own technology including having a fully charged battery, reliable internet access, and any software updates.

IN CLASS TESTING PROCEDURE

To maintain the security of exams and prepare you for the security involved when taking the NCLEX-RN exam the following steps will be followed for any in-class testing:

- All personal items (e.g. books, backpacks, binders, cell phones) must be left in the back or sides of the room. **These items may not be removed from the room or opened by students until the exam is completed by the entire class.**
- Only the calculator embedded in Canvas/ATI may be used when necessary.
- Many courses require the use of Respondus LockDown Browser for exams. If an exam is taken at home the Lockdown Browser with Webcam must be utilized.
- Faculty will not answer questions related to terminology, restate the exam question, or further explain questions.
- Cell phones must be turned off. Wearable technology is not allowed to be on your body during testing.
- Faculty will move about the classroom during the exam.
- No hats will be allowed in the classroom.
- After completing the exam, students must move away from the classroom and remain quiet so as not to disturb those still taking the exam.
- Total testing time is at the discretion of the faculty in keeping with educational guidelines. Considering the total time allotted to complete the NCLEX-RN exam, you should pace yourself to spend one minute per question. Additional time is allotted for math questions.
- You must return any scratch paper before exiting the testing room.
- Test questions may not be copied in any manner for later use or distribution. This includes all exams such as faculty-developed or ATI.
- The course website on Canvas will contain information regarding the exam, exam grades, and exam review.

HONESTY AND PLAGIARISM

The college expects that students act in accordance with the College Code of Conduct regarding Personal and Academic Integrity and in an honest manner. Therefore, students will demonstrate in all aspects of student life, comporment, and personal integrity consistent with that of a professional.

INCLEMENT WEATHER CLASS AND/OR CLINICAL CANCELLATION

The College reserves the right to cancel classes and/or clinical in the case of severe weather. Safety remains the individual student's responsibility should hazardous driving conditions prohibit attendance at class. Classes may be rescheduled at the discretion of the faculty and/or administration. Lectures may be moved to a virtual method of instruction. Clinical may move to virtual simulation.

REASONABLE ACCOMMODATION

Consistent with the mission of Saint Anthony College of Nursing and the requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and the Illinois Human Rights Act to "reasonable accommodation" will be provided to individuals with disabilities who are otherwise qualified to enroll in and graduate from the

nursing program. Please see the Associate Dean for Student for further information on the process to request an accommodation.

SMOKING/VAPING POLICY

Saint Anthony College of Nursing/Rock Valley College and OSF Saint Anthony Medical Center are non-smoking campuses. Students may not smoke/vape while in transit to, from, or during clinical experiences. Violation of this policy will result in disciplinary actions.

PARKING

Students are expected to park in designated areas. At Guilford Square, student parking is designated on the northwest side of the building. There are some designated parking spaces for staff who work after hours. Please leave those spaces for staff. When you are at our clinical agencies, remember that priority parking is for patients. Please follow any guidelines given to you by faculty about specific parking instructions.

COMMUNICATION

Email communication through Canvas/Outlook is the expected method for faculty to student correspondence. Faculty are expected to respond to emails/Canvas messages within 48 hours except for weekends and holidays, then within 72 hours. Students are expected to use their college email accounts for communication.

Texting to faculty personal phones is only with permission of faculty and in emergency situations.
